A very sturdy bag that hides its load superbly once the heavy-duty padded harness is correctly adjusted. It's excellent on the bike, with very little drag even at very high speeds. The padded back board is stiff but comfy

The two external pockets are usefully large, and six adjusters allow excess pocket and main compartment capacity to be taken out to prevent flapping. Internally there are no pockets or pouches, making it easy to stuff – though finding small items may take some fishing

It's also completely dry: heavy-duty showerproof with a welded-seam inner and a roll-top closure. "I did think it a bit big at first," noted the tester, "but it's actually just right. The best bag I've ever used on a bike."

How Lomo manage to manufacture a bag this good and full of features AND sell it for such a low price is beyond us. This rugged tarpaulin drybag has a decent-sized external pocket and a tough, comfy harness.

At first glance it looks identical to the Kappa item, but lacks the semi-rigid back board, with padded top and bottom sections instead, so some bulkier rigid items may protrude in the back. However, crucially it has a waist belt to spread the load and stop it shifting when you ride.

Capacity is huge and it is genuinely waterproof. Our tester said: "Light, strong and comfy with a handy zip compartment that's big enough to keep wet gloves from your dry stuff."

The Barracuda is a dry-lined seam-welded, rubberised tarpaulin drybag with a roll-top closure that is tough and waterproof enough to withstand even a nuclear winter

Inside there's a generous laptop sleeve and a handy net pocket for keys and small stuff. The external pocket's so small it's of marginal utility, but the cargo net is handy

Capacity is huge, though there are no adjusters for partial loading, but it's so stiff that it doesn't flap anyway. There's a rigid back board and comfy harness – and it's good on the bike, hiding the weight of the load well

"A real top-notch bag," noted the tester, "and great for being seen on dark nights."
